*Remarks*: Following the decision in 1935 to develop a light armored car on the Morris Commercial 15-cwt 4x2 truck, a design was developed using standard components with the wheelbase extended by approximately 18 inches (457mm). Armed with a .55 caliber BOYS anti-tank rifle and a .303 BREN light machine gun the new vehicle was put into production with a total of between 100 and 120 completed by 1939 (sources vary on exact number). The 12th Lancers used thirty-eight vehicles in France; while the 11th Hussars used a large number of cars in North Africa. The cars in North Africa remained in service until mid-1941 when those still remaining were removed from service.
