

Remarks: The last of the wartime AEC heavy armored cars, the Mk III carried the same 75mm cannon as mounted on the Staghound Mk III, but without the rather cramped Crusader turret. The new turret was made of 30mm armor plate and was of welded construction. Power for the turret was supplied using an electric drive. Another improvement was the addition of a second exhaust fan in the turret roof. The AEC Mk III was usually assigned to the Heavy Troop of an armored car regiment to supply some direct support for the lighter units. After World War II the Mk III were dropped from British service as they wore out, cars also soldiered on with

Yugoslavia, Denmark (three cars for just a year or so) and Belgium, where they remained in service until at least 1960. 200 Mk IIIs were completed and carried British serial numbers F88878 thru F89077.
