Remarks: Initial planning for the Mark 3 started in late 1940, with quantity production of the Mark 3 beginning in May 1941 and ending in August 1942. By the time





production ended, 1,780 Mark 3 MFF and 798 Mark 3 ME and a further 52 vehicles converted to up-gunned cars to supply the Light Aid Detachments in North Africa. Besides improved mechanicals, attention was paid to improving crew comfort. The general thickness of the armor plate remained at .24 inch (6mm) with all forward facing areas at a full .47 inch (12mm) of protection. While early Mark 3s had an access door on each side of the crew compartment and the spare tire mounted on the rear slope, later Versions had the tire to
